- a. What attitude of the poet towards death is revealed in 'Crossing Brooklyn Ferry'?
- b. Write a short note on Langston Hughes's 'I, too' as a commentary on racism.
- c. Assess the importance of the role of Nick Carraway in *The Great Gatsby*.

- d. What does Holden do when he hides himself in New York City?
- e. Comment very briefly on the classical Oedipal trajectory that Lavinia traces in *Mourning Becomes Electra*.
- f. In *Raisin in the Sun*, what do the Youngers of the family of Chicago intend to do with the money coming from the life insurance policy?

1. Answer *any three* of the following questions:

- a. Assess the contribution of Aurobindo Ghosh to Indian English poetry.
- b. In 'To the Pupils of the Hindu College' is revealed a teacher's "passionate temparament combined with unbounded sympathy". Discuss.
- c. 'Hunger' shows the poet's distress over poverty and discrimination of women. Discuss.
- d. Write a note on the theme of discrimination along lines of class and gender in *Tara*. Or

Discuss the themes of love and sexuality in Hayavadana.

e. *Untouchable* is a critique of India's caste system. Discuss. Or

The Hungry Tide is a novel that depicts the history of the dispossessed. Discuss.

- b. Discuss briefly two poetic devices used by the poet to develop the theme of the poem 'The Seasons of the Plains'?
- c. How does the poet show his love and pity for the animal in 'Epitaph of a Street Dog'?
- d. Write a brief note on the significance of Tara's name in *Tara*. Or

"But the question now is simply this: whose wife is she?" Critically comment on this line from *Hayavadana*.

- e. How is Sohini treated by Pundit Kali Nath?
- f. Write a short note on the myth of Bon Bibi in the context of *The Hungry Tide*.
